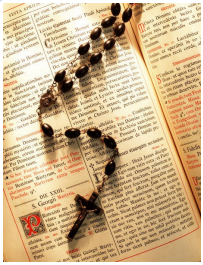
Consider how numerous are my enemies, and how fierce is their hatred of me.

## Spiritual Reflection, Deacon Joe



The church (both West and East) dedicate the month of

October to the Blessed Virgin Mary. In the West, it is the official the “Month of the Most Holy Rosary” It was Pope Leo XIII, who first released encyclicals on the rosary in 1883. He urged Catholics to increase devotion to the Virgin Mary, especially through praying the rosary. Hence, Pope Leo XIII dedicated the month of October to Our Lady of the Holy Rosary. The official feast day of Our Lady of the Rosary is October 7th. As Catholics and Knights, you are very familiar with the importance of this devotion, and undoubtedly pray the rosary and contemplate its mysteries regular. Through Mary, we are always led to Jesus.

Traditionally, the Eastern churches also commemorate the Mother of God (‘Theotokos’ in Greek ‘Bohorodice’ in Slavonic). On October 1st we observe “The Protection of the Mother of God and Ever-Virgin Mary”, a feast that commemorates her miraculous appearance in 911 at the Church of Blachernae in Constantinople and the deliverance of the people from attack through her protection. **“Protected by your coming, O Mother of God, well-believing people solemnly celebrate today, and gazing upon your immacu-**

**late image, they humbly say: “Watch over us with your noble protection, and delivers us from all evil by king your Son, Christ our God, to save our souls.”**

### How did the Rosary Arise?

No area in Christian life is so susceptible to fads and fashion as the techniques of prayer. Yet the rosary has persevered through many centuries, enduring a full frontal assault in the years of the Reformation. From generation to generation, it has won the approval of all the popes and the most revered of the faithful: Saint Thomas Aquinas, Saint Alphonsus Liguori, Louis Pasteur, Fulton Sheen, and Mother Teresa of Calcutta, to name just a few.

Where did it begin? It’s almost impossible to say. Legend has it that Mary herself appeared to Saint Dominic Guzman, the founder of the Dominicans, handed him the beads, and taught him to pray. Indeed, Dominic and his order do deserve most of the credit for the spread of the devotion in the High Middle Ages.

History, however, indicates that Christians were reciting the rosary even before Dominic was born. The prayer probably developed gradually over centuries. Believers in the East had the habit of counting their prayers on strings of beads or knotted strings. Monks used these strings to keep count as they recited all the Bible’s 150 psalms.

Simple Christians, many of whom couldn’t read, adapted the practice by substituting 150 recitations of other prayers. Thus, this practice was sometimes called the poor man’s psalter. The prayer most often chosen was the Hail Mary, recited over fifteen rounds of ten.

The Protestant historian Anne Winston-Allen has shown that the rosary was a profoundly Christ-centered devotion and the most potent force “for spiritual renewal and reform on the eve of the Reformation.”

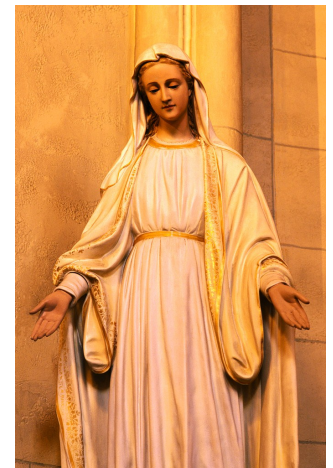
The how of the rosary is not too difficult to pick up—the fingering of the beads, the repetition of the words. Its simplicity has made it popular among the most immense variety of people. Where most people get hung up is in the meditation. When we repeat the formal prayers, we try to focus our mind and heart upon the given event from the life of Jesus. We try to place ourselves within the scene, imagining what it was like to be there.

This is the stuff of the rosary. Yet this is where we will be most prone to distraction. Once we open the corral of our imagination, there’s not telling which horses will run loose—or how far afield they’ll go. That’s why I always recommend scripture as the foundation of all rosary meditation. We have to immerse ourselves in scripture so that each mystery of the rosary evokes countless

biblical associations, from both the Old and New Testaments. For the mysteries—the events of Jesus’ life—did not arise out of nothing. God has been preparing each of them from all eternity.

The above are excerpts for the book *Hail, Holy Queen*, by Scott Hahn. This is a highly recommended book to those interested in understanding Mary’s role and place in the Church. Most Reverend Justin Rigali, Archbishop of St. Louis says, “I believe that so many people will find, *Hail, Holy Queen* very helpful in discovering and rediscovering Mary. The books style is simple and elegant. Its message, in fidelity fo Vatican II, is crystal-clear in concentrating our attention on Mary, the Mother of God, in her relationship to Christ and His Church.

**Fraternal, Patriotic or Civil Reflection by Jim Kiffer:**

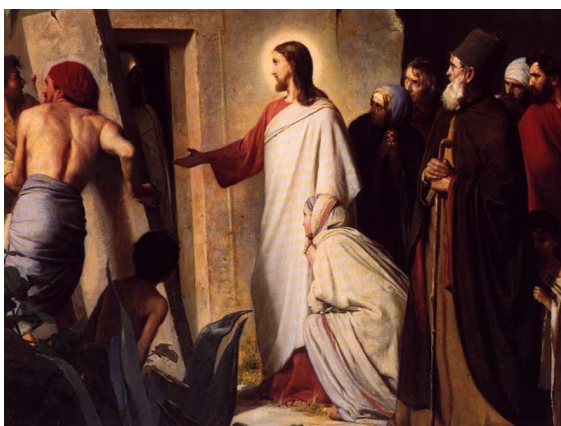
Reflection for the Month – I would like to reflect on a somewhat different topic. While watching the news, I kept thinking of the "Muslit's my opinion that one of the greatest ministries for Council members of the Fourth Degree is our Assembly's Color Corps and Regalia support at our departed Brothers' wakes and funerals. Not only are we honoring a Brother Knight but I've seen firsthand the comfort it brings to the surviving spouse and family. I've often thought of what a departed Brother would have to say to us if he could suddenly come back to life.

In chapter 11 of the Gospel of John, Lazarus of Bethany is restored to life by Jesus four days after his death.

There are seven signs that illustrate Jesus' divine authority; Christ called Lazarus forth, not in the name of the Father, but on His own divine authority! This "climactic sign" shows Jesus' power over the greatest enemy of mankind death.

The Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholic traditions offer different accounts of Lazarus' life, after being raised from the dead. According to the Eastern tradition, Lazarus fled from Judea to Cyprus, because of rumored plots on his life. According to Eastern tradi-

tion, St. Paul appointed him as the first Bishop of Kittim (Larnaca). He lived there for thirty more years and on his death was buried there for the second and last time. There is also an interesting story that the Virgin Mary personally wove his bishop's pallium, and presented to him, herself. In 890, a tomb was found in Larnaca bearing the inscription "Lazarus the friend of Christ". Emperor Leo VI of Byzantium had Lazarus' remains moved to Constantinople in 898.



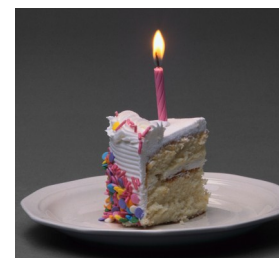
According to Western, medieval tradition, Lazarus, Mary, and Martha, were "put out to sea by the Jews hostile to Christianity in a vessel without sails, oars, or helm, and after a miraculous voyage landed in Provence. The family is then said to have separated, travelling to different parts of southeastern Gaul to preach; Lazarus went to Marseilles. He is believed to have converted many people to Christianity and was appointed the first Bishop of Marseille. During the persecution of the Emperor Domitian, he was impris-

oned and beheaded in a cave beneath the prison Saint-Lazare. His body was later moved to Autun, where he was buried in the Cathedral, dedicated to Lazarus as *Saint Lazare*. However, the inhabitants of Marseilles claim to be in possession of his head which they still venerate.

Both traditions agree that he became a bishop and seldom, if ever smiled again during the thirty years after his resurrection, worried by the sight of unredeemed souls he had seen during his four-day stay in Hades. Lazarus is commemorated on the Saturday before Palm Sunday in the Eastern tradition. In the Western tradition, he is remembered along with his sister, Martha, on July 29<sup>th</sup>.

But, what would he have to tell us today? Is wealth the secret to happiness? Maybe we should appreciate every day we see the sun rise. We should certainly appreciate our loving family and friends. We should forgive those who trespass against us. We should definitely honor our men and women in uniform who guard our freedoms, especially our freedom of religion. Congratulations to all US Navy veterans on the 236<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the birth of the US Navy on October 13<sup>th</sup>.

**Three Components of the 40 Days for Life Campaign**

**Prayer and fasting:** Christ told us some demons can only be driven out by prayer and fasting. The two go hand in hand. Prayer keeps us rooted in the fact that it is our desire to carry out God's will. Fasting is a sacrifice that helps us reach beyond our own limitations with God's help. Fasting is not a Christian diet; it is a form of physical prayer. You can fast from food, TV, alcohol ... anything that separates you from God.

**Constant vigil:** The most visible component of 40 Days for Life is a constant prayer vigil outside a place where children are aborted. It is the hope that the vigil can be maintained 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

It is a prayerful witness to the clinic's patients and employees, and to the entire community, that evil is in our midst and that with God's help, it will be defeated.

**Community outreach:** During 40 Days for Life, the pro-life message is proactively taken to the community through focused, grassroots educational efforts.

People are given the opportunity to visibly show their support for 40 Days for Life. A door-to-door petition and education drive reaches out. Informational flyers can raise awareness about abortion. Church involvement, media contact and campus outreach also contribute.

**NONTAXABLE IRA DISTRIBUTION:** This year, 2011, is the final year to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution from your IRA that that you can exclude from taxable income. It will be considered a non-taxable distribution meaning you do not need to itemize deductions to take advantage of it. A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a nontaxable distribution made directly by the trustee of your IRA (other than a SEP or SIMPLE IRA) to an organization eligible to receive tax-deductible contributions (e.g., Holy Name of Jesus Church). You must have been at least 70 and one-half years old when the distribution was made, and your total QCD cannot exceed \$100,000. The QCD also counts toward your Required Minimum Distribution.
